Preliminary trials also will be held at the Ball Pool Wednesday, August 25th, at Weymouth's, Thursday, August 26th.

The first three in each preliminary event will be listed and the six best times in each event of each class will qualify for the final contests.

The boys and girls classes the first place winner in each event at the preliminaries will qualify automatically for the finals with the officials selecting the four fastest second and third place entrants for the remaining four positions to fill out the seven lanes for races at the Ball Pool.

Preliminaries in the senior classes will be held at one time, 7:30 P. M., Wednesday, August 25th, at the Frank H. Ball pool.

Mayor Frank A. Homan and other city officials will officiate at the grand finals August 27th.

More than a score of midget automobiles will bound off a half dozen at a time in the heat races preliminary to semi-final and main events at 8:15 o'clock tonight at the Airport Speedway. The large entry list is expected to provide the usual interesting program and draw the weekly capacity crowd.

His work of vengeance, however, may be complicated considerably by the presence of up and coming Glen Cooper of Oakland, whose pleasing white No. 12 is becoming a definite factor in the Italian Entertainment Park oval.

OBSTACLE RACES WILL BE RUN AT CYCLE REOPENING

A series of obstacle races and other feature stunt events will supplement the regular program of handicap and scratch races at the renewal of short track motorcycle racing at 8:15 P. M. Thursday at the Airport Speedway. The stunt race will be provided by a group of Fresno nonprofessional riders and the regular lineup of California professionals will participate in the handicap events.

The Thursday night program will be a benefit affair for the Fresno County Peace Officers Association, and advance sales by the large corps of ticket sellers indicate a complete sell-out with the possibility of standing room only signs being hung out before the last of the anticipated crowd trickles through the gates.

Reopening of the Fresno track by the cyclists will mark the bolting of a new California state circuit with weekly races scheduled here on Thursday nights, in Los Angeles on Wednesday nights, and in Sacramento and Emeryville on alternate Friday nights. J. C. Burnett, who is promoting the local circuit, says the main purpose of the circuit is to develop new riders to take the places of such former favorites as Lammy Lamoreaux, Cordy Milne, Bo Leman and others who have forsaken California tracks for good because of the much greater remuneration to them on foreign tracks.

Riders Wager

Bert Lewis of Pasadena will headline this week's local program, with the possibility of Minny Wain and Sam Arnsa may put in an appearance to contest skids with the Southern California scratch man. His principal competition otherwise will come from Jack Bechtold and Ed Ince of Los Angeles, both of whom have advanced from forty yard handicap racing to the ten yard position since they took up the sport seriously last year.

Bechtold and Ince have a friendly wager between themselves over which will be the first to achieve scratch racing.

Others on the program who already have filed entries include: Ed Kradjan of Fresno, recently advanced to the class A company with the possibility of San Jose's Ewald Schmitter and Al and Otto Lauer of Sacramento, Leonard and Roy Andrea of Stockton and Garland Johnson of Pasadena.

The obstacle race variations of which are proving highly popular with spectators at Sacramento and Los Angeles, will be run among three men teams, members of which must change shirts and hats on each lap before negotiating one fifth mile distance completed by their own feet or end which they must circle before proceeding with the race.

Marathon Swim Ace Sets Record

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Elwood Woodling of Ohio State University set a new record today in winning for the second straight year the three and one half mile marathon swim for the George Pawling trophy in the Schuylkill River at Miquon.

Woodling covered the distance in 55 minutes 6 seconds against the previous mark of 58 minutes set by Gayde Dorrfield, Philadelphia, in 1927.

"There will be no wholesale dealings," Giles asserted. "I can't say now what players will be available for deals. What we are interested in strengthening the club. Mainly we are looking for outfielders and we plan to buy some from the minor leagues."

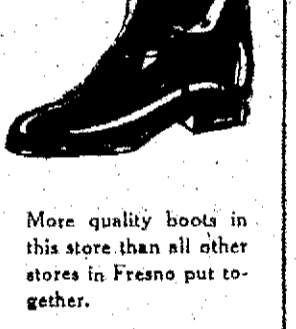

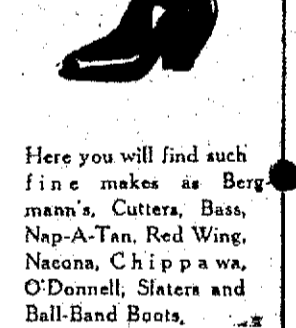

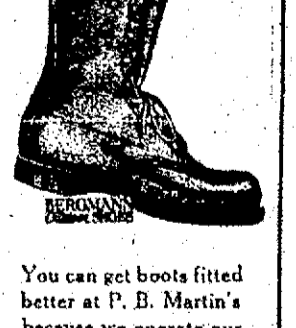
